## **RULES**

1. The Society shall be called the WOLSINGHAM AND WEAR VALLEY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY
2. The Society shall consist of a President, Vice President, Patrons, Councillors, Treasurer, Secretary and Members, and a Patron shall be eligible to be a Vice-President
3. An Annual Subscriber as Defined in Rule 17 of the General Regulations shall be a Member and each Member shall be entitled to one vote at the Annual General Meeting.
4. The Annual General Meeting of the Society shall be held as soon as possible, but not later than the last day of February in each year and at that meeting the President, Vice President, Patrons, Council, Secretary and Bankers shall be Elected by Ballot.
5. The Council shall consist of Forty Members of the Society with power to co-opt, up to the date of the following Annual General Meeting, the President, Vice-President, and Patrons Members of the Council Ex-officio.
6. Members of the Council shall be eligible for re-election and shall be assumed to be candidates for re-election unless they notify their contrary intention to the General Secretary three days before the Annual General Meeting, but that approximately one-third retire annually, they being eligible for re-election but not en-bloc. Proposals for election to the Council shall be made in writing, signed by two members of the Society and shall reach the Secretary three days before the date of the Annual General Meeting in each year.
7. The Chairman must retire after three years in office.
8. The first business of the Council shall be the election of Chairman and Vice-Chairman for the ensuing year.
9. The Council, nine of whom shall form a quorum, shall determine the amount of prizes to be offered, appoint sub-committees, collectors, stewards and generally decide all matters appertaining to the management of the Society.
10. The annual accounts of the Society shall be audited and a certified copy sent to each member.
11. The Secretary shall take all the minutes of the meetings, and along with the Treasurer shall keep the Society's Accounts and prepare them for audit prior to the Annual General Meeting, give not less than five days notice to each Member of the Annual General Meeting and not less than five days notice to each Member of the Council of meetings of the Council.
12. Members, exhibitors and competitors shall be bound by and subject to the rules and regulations of the Society.

## **GENERAL REGULATIONS**

The following Regulations are binding upon exhibitors, competitors and all persons entering the Show Ground on the Show Days.

1. Entries, which should be on the forms provided for the purpose, will be accepted by the Secretary up to and including the dates specified. Notice of entry must be in writing and must be accompanied by the proper entry fee (for which, see under the separate sections).
2. All exhibits must be the bona-fide property, at the date of their entry, of the exhibitor in whose name they are entered.
3. In any question of radius the measurement will be that of the Ordnance Survey plan with the Wolsingham Town Hall as centre. In any question of age, time shall be reckoned up to the date of the Show, September 4th.
4. In order to qualify for a prize limited to members of a particular society or organisation, exhibitors must be a member of such Society or organisation, on or before 17th August.

5. All Exhibits must be on the Showground at least half an hour before the advertised time of Judging on the date of the Show. In the Trotting Classes, declarations must be made at the Secretary's Tent on the arrival and also at least half an hour before each event.
6. All exhibitors and competitors will be required to follow the instructions of the Stewards and Judges. Failure to do so may be penalised by cancellation of entry.
7. The Council, acting by the Stewards, may disqualify any entry which appears to be so marked as to identify the exhibitor.
8. The Council, acting by the Judges, Stewards or Veterinary Surgeons, may remove from the Show Ground any exhibit whose behaviour or condition is in their opinion likely to cause loss or damage to any person.
9. The Society will make the best arrangements in its power for the safety and proper accommodation of all persons, stock and produce in the Show Ground but it will not assume responsibility for any loss or damage suffered by any person at or in connection with the Show.
10. Horses and Cattle must be led by bridle or halter and must remain in charge of proper attendants until removed from the Show Ground.
11. Horse substitute entries will be accepted, provided the Secretary is notified before the stated Judging time.
12. The Judges may withhold a prize or prizes when they find evident want of merit. When there is only One Exhibit in a class the Judge is not bound to award the First Prize, but shall award the prize he considers appropriate. The Society reserves the right to withhold payment of more than One prize when there are less than Three Entries; and of more than Two prizes when there are less than Five entries in any one class. (exception to this regulation are dogs - K.C. rules).
13. It is a condition of payment of prize money that all prize winners in the Horse and Cattle Sections shall parade in the Large Ring at 2.00pm approx., and that no exhibit shall be removed from the Show Ground before 4.30pm save with the written consent of the Secretary.
14. The Society reserves the right (save in the Dog Classes) of cancelling the whole or any part or any class or section and of providing a competent substitute for any Judge who is unable to act.
15. Objections to any entries must be given in writing to the Secretary prior to the decision of the Judge and the sum of Twenty Pounds (£20.00) must be deposited at the same time. The decision of the Council upon such objections and upon the return or retention of the deposit shall be final and binding.
16. No person under any pretext whatever will be allowed in the Judging Rings or Tents during the awarding of the prizes except the Judges and Stewards duly appointed for that Section and the necessary attendant.
17. A Personal Subscriber of £5.00 shall be entitled to one Admission ticket to the Show which will be valid on one of the days in September. The tickets can be used either for entrance to the Show or Showfield Car Park.
18. EXHIBITORS ADMISSION TICKETS. Free admission tickets will be granted to exhibitors in proportion to their entry fees paid. See also Dog Section Show Regulation 11.
19. The Society's Silver Cup(s) to be returned by previous winner(s) to the Secretary at least 14 days before the next Show.
20. Exhibitors not in receipt of acknowledgement of Entries or Class Numbers by 11.00am, 31st August contact Section Secretaries.

## **IMPORTANT NOTICE TO EXHIBITORS**

The safety of the public at Agricultural Shows has always been of much concern to the organisers but has now become a matter of paramount importance in relation to Public Liability Insurance and the Health & Safety at Work Act 1974 with additions and amendments. The Show is no exception and presents many difficult problems because of its size in terms of numbers of people and live stock at the Show.

In order to meet legal and insurers requirements, it has been necessary to introduce arrangements to segregate, as far as possible, the general public from livestock. The Society has appointed a specific team of Stewards - Stewards of Safety - to supervise the implementation of these measures which will control the movement of people and livestock to and from different areas of the Show Grounds. **THE DIRECTIONS OF THE STEWARDS OF SAFETY MUST BE FOLLOWED AT ALL TIMES.**

It is in your own interests to comply with all instructions and to observe the procedures laid down and the Society would appreciate your full co-operation in this. However, should any exhibitor refuse to comply with the instructions of the Stewards of Safety, The Society will have no alternative but to immediately remove from the Show Grounds that exhibitor's entries and all fees paid or prizes won will be forfeit. This condition will be strictly enforced and no appeal will be entertained.

Details of the routes to be taken from stabling areas to the various showing and jumping rings will be prominently displayed at the Show. You are urged to familiarise yourself with these and to seek the advice/assistance of the Stewards of Safety if you are in doubt about any aspect of this matter.

No dried or silk flowers are allowed. The different kinds of plant need to be taken from different groups. For instance, pinks, carnations and sweet william which are dianthus would not be classed as different kinds. Judges should use their discretion when judging, bearing in mind that entries may come from inexperienced exhibitors. Judges should note that the display has to be viewed all round.

## **SET RECIPES :**

### **FRUIT HONEY CAKE:**

250g S.R. Flour                      200g Honey                      125g butter or margarine  
200g sultanas                      2 eggs    pinch of salt.

Mix the honey with the butter or margarine until creamy. Add the eggs one by one and mix thoroughly. Mix the salt with the sieved flour and fold into the eggs/honey/butter or margarine mixture. Finally add the fruit. Bake in a 17 - 20cm circular tin, lined with greaseproof paper for 1-11/2 hours in a hot oven at Gas mark 4 or 180C / 350F.

### **BANANA and HONEY TEABREAD.**

8oz / 225g S.R.Flour                      1/4 tsp freshly grated nutmeg  
4oz / 100g margarine                      8oz / 225g bananas  
4oz / 100g caster sugar                      grated rind of 1 lemon  
2 extra large eggs                      6 tblsps thick honey

#### **For the topping:**

2 tblsps thick honey                      crushed sugar cubes for sprinkling

Pre-heat the oven to 180C / 350F / Gas 4. Lightly grease and base line a 2 lb loaf tin with greaseproof paper.

#### **Method:**

Measure the flour and nutmeg into a large bowl and rub in the fat until it resembles fine breadcrumbs. Peel and mash the bananas and stir into the flour mixture with the sugar, lemon rind, eggs and honey. Beat well until evenly mixed, then turn into the prepared tin and level the surface. Bake in the pre-heated oven for about 1 1/4 hours or until a fine skewer inserted into the centre comes out clean. Cover the teabread loosely with foil during the end of cooking time if it is browning too much. Allow the teabread to cool slightly in the tin, then turn out on to a wire rack and leave to cool completely. For the topping, gently warm the honey in a small pan, then brush over the top of the teabread. Sprinkle with the crushed sugar.

## LIGHT FRUIT CAKE.

225g / 8oz butter softened  
4 eggs beaten  
275g / 9 1/2oz S.R.Flour (sifted)  
250g / 9oz mixed dried fruit including raisins, sultanas, apricots, peaches, pears, apples, chopped if necessary. (Look out for bags of mixed dried fruit salad for this recipe which you could use instead of mixing your own)  
75g / 2 3/4ozs of quartered cherries or dried cranberries  
2tbsp demerara sugar

200g / 7oz light muscovado sugar  
finely grated rind of 1 lemon  
1/2 tsp baking powder

Pre-heat the oven to 180C / 350F / Gas 4

### Method:

Grease and line a 20cm round cake tin with baking parchment.  
Place all the ingredients except the fruit and demerara sugar in a large bowl and beat well using a wooden spoon or electric whisk until creamy.  
Stir in the fruit. Spoon the cake mixture into the tin and smooth the surface using a metal spoon.  
Sprinkle with the sugar and bake for approx. 1 hour and 20 mins. or until the cake is well risen and pale golden brown. Leave to cool on a wire rack
